To the inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the [S.S.] County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at **Loudon Town Hall on Clough Hill Road** in said Loudon, NH on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 1–2 will be by ballot vote on Tuesday, March 9, 2010, between the hours of 8:00 AM and 7:00 PM at the polls at Loudon Town Hall on Clough Hill Road.

Articles 3–7 will be taken up at the second session of the annual Town Meeting on Saturday, March 13, 2010 at 9:00 AM at the Loudon Elementary School Gym on School Street.

ARTICLE 1:

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2:

• ZONING AMENDMENT 2010-1

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment 2010-1 proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Loudon Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Section 205.3, AFP District — Uses Permitted by Special Exception to include (J) Dormitory type housing for seasonal agricultural workers provided housing remains empty for at least six months out of each calendar year. Seasonal workers must be employed at place of residence. AND to add the following definition: Dormitory Type Housing: A building for the sole purpose of housing seasonal agricultural workers.

Reason: *This use is currently permitted by special exception in the RR District. It is reasonable to have it permitted by special exception in the AFP District where most of the town's farms are located. The definition will clarify the type of structure permitted for such use.*

• ZONING AMENDMENT 2010-2

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment 2010-2 proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Loudon Zoning Ordinance as follows: Continue the Growth Management Ordinance that is currently in place with a 2% annual limitation and will lapse on April 30, 2010 if not re-enacted. If passed, the Growth Management Ordinance would then lapse on April 30, 2012 unless re-enacted by a vote of the Town Meeting.

Reason: *To continue the Growth Management Ordinance with the intent to limit the town's exposure to an unusual spike in growth and to foster a normal and sustainable rate of growth.*

• ZONING AMENDMENT 2010-3

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment 2010-3 proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Loudon Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Section 701.2, Variance to include new language as a result of legislation passed in July 2009, effective January 1, 2010 (RSA 307:5-307:8).

Reason: *To make wording consistent with State statutes.*

• ZONING AMENDMENT 2010-4

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment 2010-4 proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Loudon Zoning Ordinance as follows: Adopt a "Workforce Housing Ordinance" under the authority of RSA 674:21, and is intended as an "Inclusionary Zoning" provision as defined in RSA 674:21(I)(k) and 674:21(IV)(a), as well as RSA 672:1, III-e. The Ordinance defines the boundaries of a Workforce Housing Overlay District with an attached map and provides density bonuses and permits uses consistent with the encouragement of the development of workforce housing as stipulated in the aforementioned RSAs. The Workforce Housing Overlay District map associated with this Ordinance will also become part of the official zoning map for the Town of Loudon.

Reason: *To comply with legislation passed in June 2008, effective January 1, 2010.*

• ZONING AMENDMENT 2010-5

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment 2010-5 proposed and recommended by the Planning Board for the Loudon Zoning Ordinance as follows: Amend Reprocessed Soil Permitting Process section of the Zoning Ordinance by deleting Env-wm 2603.05 (d)(2)(a)(06/96) or Env-wm 3203.11 (a) AND replacing with (current version).

Boy Scout Troop #247 presented the colors and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Philip asked for a moment of silence for the Men & Women in the Middle East.

Philip introduced the Selectmen, Roger Maxfield, Dustin Bowles and Steve Ives. Then the Ballot Clerks, Eileen Cummings, Charlene Morin, Dorothy Mulkhey and Helen McNeil also the Supervisors of the Checklist, Dawn Pearl, Lynn Riel and Diane Bullock. Followed by Town Clerk, Terry Hamel Deputy Town Clerk Deirdre Littlefield, Office Manager Jean Lee and Sound System Coordinator Ray Dow.

Lieutenant Robert Krieger gave a special plaque to Chief Robert Fiske for 40 years of dedication to the Residents and past and present employees. Chief Fiske was quite surprised to be receiving it. He thanked everyone and quickly exited the stage.

Article #3 passed as read.

ARTICLE 4:

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Recreation Revolving Fund pursuant to RSA 35-B: 2 11. The money received from fees and charges for recreation park services and facilities shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered to be part of the town's general fund unreserved fund balance. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon order of the recreation director (no further town meeting approval required). These funds may be expended only for recreation purposes as stated in RSA 35-B, and no expenditures shall be made in such a way as to require the expenditure of other town funds that have not been appropriated for that purpose. Further to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 from the unreserved fund balance for this purpose. The Selectmen recommend this article. *Moved by Steve Ives, Seconded by Dustin Bowles.*

There was a clarification regarding \$1000. that is in a Capital Reserve Fund.

Article #4 passed as read.

ARTICLE 5:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish or amend fees or charges pursuant to RSA 41:9a. If approved, this authorization will remain in effect until rescinded. *Moved by Roger Maxfield, Seconded by Steve Ives.*

Discussion ensued regarding the Selectmen being able to increase fees without the Town's people approving them. Selectman Steve Ives read the RSA pertaining to this article. This is basically a housekeeping article.

Article #5 passed as read.

ARTICLE 6:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to participate in a bi-annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day in the Spring of 2010. This article would affect the tax rate by 2 cents per \$1,000.00 value. *Moved by Dustin Bowles, Seconded by Roger Maxfield.*

Steve Bennett from the Transfer Station and Recycle Committee clarified that this would happen every 2 years. Discussion ensued regarding if we needed to raise the funds this year for 2010. Point of clarification was made to the

budget year and when this money plans to be spent. The Budget year is from July 1–June 30th. This day is planned for Spring 2010.

Cory Clark made an amendment for this article to \$5,000 with the suggestion to draft an article for the next town meeting to appropriate the other \$5000. Discussion ensued. Steve Ives recommended to not vote for this amendment. Amendment failed, back to original article, more discussion.

Article #6 passed as read.

ARTICLE 7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$186,000.00, for the purchase of an Ambulance and Equipment, with said funds to be withdrawn from the Ambulance/Rescue Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, and to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to carry said purpose in to effect. This article will not affect the tax rate. *Moved by Roger Maxfield, Seconded by Steve Ives.*

This Ambulance is listed in the 2009–2010 Capitol Improvements Program as proposed by the Fire Department. Just after the 2008 town meeting a committee was formed to look at replacing the current Ambulance, a 1999 PL Custom. This committee looked at the needs of the department, they viewed ambulances from four manufacturers and then wrote a set of specifications. Those specifications were then sent out to four ambulance manufacturers.

Chief Jeff Burr clarified the need for the Ambulance.

Article # 7 passed as read.

ARTICLE 8:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160,000.00 for the purpose of resurfacing Soucook Lane and Lovering Avenue, and for preparing Hollow Route Road and the paved portion of Bumfagon Road for future paving. \$100,000.00 to be withdrawn from the Roadway Improvement Capital Reserve Fund and the balance to be raised from taxes. This article will affect the tax rate by 12 cents per \$1,000.00 value. *Moved by Dustin Bowles, Seconded by Roger Maxfield.*

Discussion ensued, some clarification of stimulus package.

Article #8 passed as read.

ARTICLE 9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$74,725.00 for the purpose of hiring one additional full time Firefighter/Emergency Medical Technician. The sum of \$44,030.00 will be for salary. The sum of \$30,695.00 representing the Town's portion of expenses (the increase in benefits, clothing and equipment needed to outfit said person) that is not included in the posted budget for the year 2009-2010 for the current staffing level. This article would affect the tax rate by 13 cents per \$1,000.00 value. *Moved by Steve Ives, Seconded by Dustin Bowles.*

Discussion ensued. Deborah Kardaseski asked for ballot vote with five registered voters that were present. Ballot Clerks Helen McNeil and Charlene Morin showed that the ballot boxes were empty.

Yes – 150 No – 94

Article #9 passed as read.

Steve Ives made a motion to restrict reconsideration of articles #3–#8. Seconded by many.

Motion passed.

ARTICLE 10:

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 673:1, II to establish an Agricultural Commission consisting of five (5) members and four (4) alternates. Members and alternates of the Agricultural Commission to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Commission will work with other town boards on issues that affect farmers and can serve as an information bridge between farm businesses and the non-farm public. By petition. *Moved by Roger Maxfield, Seconded by Steve Ives.*

Carol Soule spoke in favor of this article.

Article #10 passed as read.

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,602,261.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. This article does not include any of the previous warrant articles. *Moved by Steve Ives, Seconded by Dustin Bowles.*

Kathy Pitman moved an amendment that the total budget for the Town of Loudon for 2009–2010 be reduced to \$4,239,881.00 from the proposed \$4,602,261.00. Not to include previous warrant articles. Seconded by Peter Pitman. Then 5 registered voters requested a ballot vote.

Yes – 90 No – 148

Amendment failed.

Peter Pitman moved to restrict reconsideration of Article #9. Seconded by many.

Passed.

Second Amendment moved by Peter Pitman, Peter moved that all budget line items in section 45500 Library, including 01-45500-100-110 through and including 01-45500-800-886, to be reduced by 25.33%, to bring the bottom line total of 45500 Library to \$134,952.00. Seconded by Katherine Pitman. Then a request from 5 registered voters to vote by ballot.

Yes – 78 No – 137

Amendment failed.

Cory Clark moved to amend Article #11 to make line item 01-41301-100-120 Selectmen PT office help to \$0. Seconded by Peter Pitman.

Amendment failed.

Cory Clark moved to amend Article #11 to make line item 01-41941-401-413 Town Hall Repairs to \$5,000. Seconded by Peter Pitman.

When Cory Clark realized that the line item was for the Town Hall instead of the Town Office he withdrew the amendment.

Steve Ives moved to restrict reconsideration of Article #11 Seconded by Peter Pitman.

Passed.

The original article passed as read with the budget for the ensuing 2009–2010 year to be \$4,602,261.00.

ARTICLE 12:

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. *Moved by Steve Ives, Seconded by Dustin Bowles.*

Motion to adjourn at 1:00 PM.

2009 SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your Selectmen conducted town business with effective outcomes. Selectmen's minutes substantiate that hundreds of issues were addressed throughout the year. Thankfully, there were no natural disasters this year.

Each November, the Selectmen formulate a new town budget that becomes effective July 1 of the following year. Projecting a budget that begins eight months from the time of preparation requires due diligence. This budget is presented in accordance with law, at budget hearings, and annual town meeting. It includes estimated revenue, expenditures for town operations, payments to Merrimack County, and Merrimack Valley School District. This budget process consumes several days of the Selectmen's time, and every effort is made to establish a conservative budget. We thank all department heads for their timely budget submissions.

The town tax rate of \$19.84 for the 2009–2010-tax year, increased by \$1.22 per thousand over the previous year. There are several specific factors for annual increases. For example, the 2005–2006-tax rate was \$20.67 per thousand, when the Merrimack Valley School district passed a \$20,000,000 bond to build or repair district schools.

A variety of factors for the tax rate increase this year include the annual budget and warrant articles voted at town meeting. Further, the Selectmen returned \$47,200 for property abatements, which is an expenditure that increases the tax rate. Taxpayers have legal rights to request abatements if they prove their properties are over-assessed. The town assessor presents findings to the Selectmen, who then approve or disapprove the abatement.

The Selectmen have projected that 3,400 tons of household trash will be sent to the Penacook burn plant during

2010. In December 2009, the per ton dollar amount will increase from \$45.90 to \$62.10 per ton. Considering the huge increase to dispose trash, the Selectmen highly encourage additional recycling. Reducing the tax rate is a team effort. We thank our citizens who make a consorted recycling effort. Instituting a "pay-to-throw" program is not an option the Selectmen wish to initiate. However, this program would reduce tonnage costs, and make recycling more attractive for our citizens.

Town Hall repairs at the Center have been completed. The devastating fire of 2005 nearly destroyed this historic building. This year, granite foundations were straightened, a new handicap ramp built, new fire escape to the second floor, and partial exterior painting. This building is registered on The National Register of Historic Buildings. The Selectmen are in the process of placing an appropriate plaque at the buildings front door indicating the building is on the National Register.

As noted in previous reports, we acknowledge the Bahre family, former owners of the New Hampshire Motor Speedway, for their endowment to create the Arthur E. McNeil/Raymond C. Cummings Memorial Scholarship Fund. The scholarships totaling \$200,000 are awarded annually to Loudon high school and college students. High school students this year received scholarships in the amounts of \$7,000, \$6,000, and \$5,000 respectively.

We thank all employees, elected officials, board and committee members for their time, work, and dedication to the Town of Loudon. Together, everyone helped make 2009 a productive year.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Town of Loudon as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Town of Loudon's internal control.

A **significant deficiency** is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. A **material weakness** is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses.

In connection with our consideration of Town of Loudon's internal control as described above, we are pleased to report that we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we considered to be material weaknesses, as defined above. Areas of opportunity for further consideration that were discussed with management included the following:

- General Operations – Continued analysis of operations and the development of systems and procedures as needs arise

FIRE DEPARTMENT

It is my pleasure to submit the Annual Report of the Loudon Fire Department. This year's report will outline where your Fire Department has been successful and present areas that need attention.

Activity Level

The Loudon Fire Department is made up of four full-time employees (Fire Chief, Lieutenant and two Firefighters). All four are Emergency Medical Technicians and firefighter cer-

tified. There are 41 very dedicated and well-trained on-call personnel. Out of the 41 personnel, 14 are EMTs who fill on-call shifts every night. Full time personnel cover seven days a week from 6:00 AM to 6:00 PM. The Fire Department responded to a total of 799 requests for assistance in the year 2009. In addition we performed more than 30,000 hours of activity supporting requests for assistance (Emergency and Non-emergency) and training.

A new law that took effect January 1, 2010 was RSA 153:10-a.

Carbon Monoxide Detection Devices in Dwellings

Explanation

Section I of the statute requires that a carbon monoxide detection device (CMD) be installed in "each unit". A multi-unit dwelling is defined as:

"any structure...which contains 2 or more single units which provide permanent or transient living facilities which may or may not include cooking and eating facilities, for one or more persons. This term shall include but not be limited to: rooming houses, dormitories, motels, hotels, apartment buildings, buildings which contain condominium units, duplexes, and houses; provided, however, that such buildings contain 2 or more units."

Section II requires that each "single family dwelling" that is newly-constructed or substantially rehabilitated after January 1, must be equipped with a CMD. Substantial rehabilitation is defined as:

"any improvement to a building or single family dwelling which is valued at an amount greater than 1/2 of the assessed valuation of the building or dwelling." Note that this is the assessed value (the value on which the property taxes are based) not the resale value of the property.

A CMD must be installed in every rental unit. A rental unit is defined as:

"any residential unit in a building or single family dwelling which provides permanent or transient living facilities for one or more persons, which is occupied by tenants on a rental basis. This term shall include but not be limited to: hotels, motels, dormitories, apartments, duplex units, rooms rented out of the home of another, and single family dwellings, so long as they are rented."

Locations

NFPA 720, Standard for the Installation of Carbon Monoxide Detection and Warning Equipment and The International Residential Code address the location of carbon monoxide detectors. Detectors should be installed outside of each separate sleeping area in the immediate area of the bedrooms.

Compliance Dates

RSA 153:10-a will become effective on January 1, 2010 for new construction. Administrative rules for this statute are being proposed for existing construction. Upon adoption of the administrative rules all dwelling units required to be protected under this statute will have two years to comply with the requirements.

As always, should you have any questions or concern on any other fire prevention matter, please don't hesitate to contact us.

Training

All Department members are required to obtain State Firefighter Level 1 or Emergency Medical Technician Basic within one year of joining the Department, in addition to attending monthly trainings both Fire and Rescue. We continue to improve and expand our skills as a result of ever-changing circumstances to include updated hazardous materials, technical rescue and Emergency Medical Training. This year two members have obtained their Emergency Medical Technician Intermediate. One member has obtained their Firefighter Level One and one member has advanced to Firefighter Two. We have two members who are attending training at New Hampshire Technical Institute on their own to become Paramedics. Thank you to all of them for the many hours they have spent in training for these achievements.

Fire Prevention

We have been very busy in fire prevention again this year as a result of the continued growth of the Town. There were and still are projects in different stages of completion. Accordingly, significant time is required for inspections and re-inspections of these properties and plans, as well as the existing buildings and occupancies that require annual life safety/fire prevention compliance review. We are also busy with fire prevention week and EMS week with the children at Loudon Elementary School and the day cares.

We have been working on the dry hydrants in town. At the present time, we are in the permitting process for cleaning another pond and adding a dry hydrant, along with changing the deed to the property.

Overall this Department issued 3 oil burning equipment permits, 110 places of assembly permits, 5 Wood stove

Inspections, and 12 Inspections of day cares, and Foster care homes.

Apparatus and Facility

This year we took possession of a 2009 PL Custom Ambulance that was approved at last year's town meeting.

The Town of Loudon has developed a Capital Improvement program to look at and plan for capital purchases with all town departments so the impact to the town is spread out evenly and by putting monies aside for planned purchases. This is a substantial savings to the town from interest on loans and the issuance of interest to monies in capital reserve accounts.

This coming year we will be writing specifications for a fire engine that is listed in the Capital Improvement Plan to be replaced in the year 2011/2012.

The Department works out of two stations, Station #2 at 56 Clough Hill Road and the Village Station at 8 Cooper Street. This year we finished the landscaping at the Village Station and the town paved around the Arthur Colby Safety Complex.

Finally, I would like to recognize the hard work and dedication of the members of your Fire Department who are continuously serving our community with pride. Our Firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians make themselves available 24 hours a day 7 days a week, at significant personal sacrifice. Their commitment to protecting our community comes at great expense with many sleepless nights, time away from their loved ones and in some cases, financial cost. Their dedication is nothing short of remarkable and I thank each of them for another very successful year. On behalf of the Loudon Fire Department, have a safe 2010.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdf.org.

Spring fire season was unusually short this past year, with wet weather beginning the third week in April and lasting virtually all summer long. Consequently both the number of fires and the number of acres burned were below the last five year average. Due to state budget constraints, the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers was limited to class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookout towers are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented this year by contracted aircraft and the Civil Air Patrol when fire danger was especially high. Surprisingly the largest single fire this year occurred in late November during an unusual dry spell, in the northern Coos County town of Clarksville. This fire burned 17.1 acres and is presumed to have been caused by a careless hunter. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2009 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. 

CAPITAL AREA MUTUAL AID FIRE COMPACT REPORT

This report is presented to the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Fire Compact as a summary of general activities for the 2009 calendar year. It is also forwarded to the Town offices of the Compact's member communities for information and distribution as desired.

The Compact's operational area is 711 square miles with a resident population of 125,225. The Equalized Property Valuation is currently listed as over thirteen billion dollars. We also provide and receive mutual aid responses with communities beyond our member area.

The Compact provides 24/7 emergency dispatching service to its twenty member communities. This service is delivered by the City of Concord Fire Department's Communications Center utilizing eight shift dispatchers and the Dispatch Supervisor. Fire and Emergency Medical dispatched calls totaled 20,624 in 2009, down slightly from the previous year. We continue to be one of the busiest regional dispatch centers in New Hampshire. The detailed activity report by community is attached.

Mutual aid automatic responses are provided from neighboring departments based on type of call, geographic proximity, type of hazard, and time of day.

The Chief Coordinator responded to 161 incidents in 2009, assisted departments with management functions on major incidents, and participated with Chief Officers in mutual aid response planning. He also participates on several state and regional committees that affect mutual aid operations. The 2007 Command Vehicle functions as a Command Post on mutual aid incidents.

Firefighter John R. Burton III of Bow resigned as Treasurer of the Compact early in 2009. John had served as Treasurer for 25 years. Unfortunately, John passed away in July. He will be missed by all.

The current officers of the Compact, elected in January 2009 are:

We continue to perform an active role in the implementation of the New Hampshire Fire Mobilization Plan. This response plan is available to all communities and mutual aid

systems statewide, or beyond, whenever their local resources have been exhausted.

Homeland Security has provided major funding in support of our communications systems upgrades. All departments received digital portable and mobile radios in recent years. The conversion of our dispatch center console to digital capability was completed in June 2009, and digital base stations were previously supplied. We have received recent grant approvals to provide microwave control of remote radio sites.

The 2009 Compact operating budget was \$ 932,187. All Compact operations, including the Chief Coordinator's position, office, command vehicle, and dispatch services are provided through this budget. Funding is by the member communities and based on a combination of property valuations and population.

The Compact Training Committee chaired by Assistant Chief Dick Pistey, with members Chief Keith Gilbert, Chief Gary Johnson, and Chief Peter Angwin assisted all departments in hosting mutual aid training exercises during the year. Mutual aid drills involve several departments and test the system capabilities in fire suppression, emergency medical, mass casualty, rescue, hazardous materials, incident management, and personnel safety. We thank the Training Committee for their continuing support to the Compact.

The Central New Hampshire HazMat Team, represents 55 communities in Capital Area and Lakes Region mutual aid systems and is ready to assist or respond to hazardous materials incidents in our combined coverage area. The team is directed by Chief Bill Weinhold with three mobile response units and welcomes personnel interested in becoming members. Thanks to the team members for their dedication in providing this important emergency service.

We urge all departments to send representatives to all Compact meetings. Your input is needed and your members need to be informed of all Compact activities and planning.

Thanks to all departments for your great cooperation.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

We have been working on many different projects. Ditching on Lovejoy, Batchelder, Lower Ridge, Soucook and Lovering, Youngs Hill, Blake, parts of Old Shaker, and Ridge Roads. Soucook Lane and Lovering Avenue were prepared for re-surfacing and the project was completed during the late summer. Bumfagon Road has received a basecoat of asphalt at the Clough Hill Road end. Prep work has also been done on Hollow Route Road, including culvert replacement. The dirt roads have taken a lot of work to keep in shape due to all the rain. Culverts on Ridge Road by Howard

Pearl's were replaced. We completed resurfacing the parking lot at the Town Office and Municipal Complex area. We also mowed ball fields, all town buildings, and Landfill Cap as needed. Roadside brush cutting has been done in many areas throughout town. Fall is when we screen winter sand for mixing with salt and stock piling for sanding dirt roads.

TRANSFER STATION

Our most recent maintenance project at the Transfer Station was to repair the retaining wall in the demolition area and reinforce it with concrete. This added stability to the wall and allows vehicles to get closer to the containers, which prevents spillage.

Also regarding the demolition containers, we try to keep unnecessary materials out of them because it costs more to dispose of waste in these than in the regular trash. For example, many items (small furniture, plastics, tarps, household trash, etc.) may be discarded in the regular trash hopper with less cost to the Town. Items that should be placed in the demo containers are: sheetrock, roof shingles, pressure treated wood, large amounts of painted or stained wood, etc.

Increased disposal costs caused an increase in some Transfer Station fees this year. Most demolition materials are now charged at a rate of \$50.00 per cubic yard (up from \$45.00). Because of their extra weight, roof shingles are now charged at a rate of \$75.00 per cubic yard. There is a \$5.00 charge for microwave ovens because a part containing hazardous material must be removed before we dispose

of the unit. We also began accepting used anti-freeze this year, for a fee of 75 cents per gallon. Remember that unlike some Transfer Stations, our purpose in charging fees is not to make a profit from residents, but to offset disposal costs. The Town still pays a share in the disposal of most of the chargeable items (such as demolition, electronics, bulbs, etc.).

Because of the support involving Loudon's first Household Hazardous Waste Day held in the fall of 2008, it was voted at Town Meeting to make this a bi-annual (every 2 years) event for Loudon residents. Our next HHWD event will be held at the Transfer Station on Saturday morning, April 10th of 2010.

Please remember to purchase your resident sticker at the Transfer Station. These are still only one dollar, and are used at the "dump" and at the Town beach at Clough Pond.

SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING COMMITTEE

Trash tonnage has fallen steadily as our economy has weakened. Loudon's actual delivered trash to the Penacook incinerator has dropped from a high of 4050 tons in 2003, to a current low of 3400 tons in 2009. This, in itself, is good news. However, our tipping fee has risen from \$37.00/ton in 2003 to \$62.10/ton in 2010. These changes have caused our projected annual tipping fees to exceed \$200,000 for the first time (tonnage for recycled materials has increased in this time period, as well — most of the change, however, is economy related).

A good sign for future recycling is the stabilizing of material prices after the huge "bump" in prices toward the end of 2008. All of our recycled material revenues have returned to the somewhat normal levels before last year's fluctuations. Even though some of the material volume is down, the value is back up. Actually, some of our recycled materials (such as paper products and plastic containers) have shown increases in tonnage, although our trash tonnage has dropped. This means Loudon residents are recycling more.

Thanks to those who have helped our recycling rates increase!

One of the ways we have tried to increase our recycling revenue is by shipping half and full trailer loads of material, which generally brings a much higher price per ton. This is why, for example, newspaper and plastic show low figures in the accompanying chart — there's not enough to make a load at this time.

Our trash Co-op is still searching for more recyclable materials to make the construction of a Single Stream Facility a practical goal. They are near the necessary 25,000-ton per year level at this point. Municipalities are understandably hesitant to commit to any changes in their budgets/waste programs in these economic times, making it difficult for the Co-op to "sign-up" new communities to deliver their recycled materials.

PLANNING BOARD

The Loudon Planning Board reviewed twenty-five applications in 2009. There were applications for four subdivisions (two minor, one major, one condominium conversion), three new site developments, six amended site developments, eight lot line adjustments, one voluntary lot merger, two daytime parking permits (one change of ownership, one no action needed), and one temporary change of use.

The Planning Board consists of six elected members, one Selectmen's representative, and two appointed alternates. The current Planning Board members are: Chairman Tom Dow (2012), Henry Huntington (2012), Steve Jackson (2010), Tom Moore (2010), Vice Chairman Stanley Prescott (2011), Gary Tasker (2011), Ex-Officio Steve Ives, and alternates Jeff Green and Bob Ordway. The Planning Board administrative assistant is Donna White.

It is the Board's responsibility to review all land use applications as well as oversee the Land Development Regulations, Zoning Ordinance revisions and updates, the Master Plan, and the Capital Improvements Program. In addition to their regular monthly meetings, Board members spend many hours on site walks, in work sessions, and participate on other committees as Planning Board representatives. Steve Jackson is the representative to the Central NH Regional Planning Commission. Bob Ordway, Tom Dow, and Stanley Prescott are representatives on the Capital Improvements committee. Stanley Prescott is the Board's representative to the Board of Permit.

This year the Board will present six zoning amendments for the voters to consider. We encourage voters to review the amendments to become fully knowledgeable of what they will be seeing on this year's ballot. The proposed amend-

ments address a variety of zoning topics. One amendment proposes the addition of a section to the Zoning Ordinance addressing Workforce Housing due to legislation that went into effect January 1, 2010. Another proposed amendment, if passed, would continue the Growth Management Ordinance that is currently in place and will lapse on April 30, 2010 if not re-enacted. Three amendments are considered housekeeping measures. One amendment clarifies language in the Wetlands Overlay District section of the Zoning Ordinance. The full text of these proposed zoning amendments is available at the Planning Board office.

Current copies of the Land Development Regulations and Zoning Ordinance are available for purchase at the Town Office. Each of the books can also be found online at the Town's website. Anyone who plans to submit an application to the Planning Board should obtain a copy of the books in order to be fully informed of what is required for that submittal.

Applications to the Planning Board must be received in our office at least fifteen days prior to the monthly meeting. The Planning Board meets on the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Community Building. The meetings are open to the public and all are invited to attend. Visit us at www.loudonnh.org for information on office hours, meeting dates, agendas, minutes, application forms, and regulations.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment processed twenty-two applications during 2009. There were two applications for variances (no action taken on one, error in filing), one application for special exception for home occupation, ten applications for special exceptions for reduced setbacks, three applications for special exceptions for wetlands (one crossing, one impact, one filling), two applications for a special exception for bulk storage tanks (one propane, one gasoline), one application for a special exception for a non-conforming use, one equitable waiver of dimensional requirements application, one application for special exception for steep slopes (withdrawn), and one ESMI reprocessed soil application request. The Board also received twelve building permit extension requests, eight of which were granted. The other requests were withdrawn by the developer.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment supports the six zoning amendments that are on this year's ballot and recommended by the Planning Board.

Current Board members are Chairman Dave Powelson (2011), Vice Chairman Ned Lizotte (2012), Roy Merrill (2010), George Saunderson (2010), and Howard Pearl

(2011). Alternate positions are held by Jonathan Huntington and Jim Venne.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets on the fourth Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm in the Community Building. Our meetings are open to the public; anyone interested is encouraged to attend.

The Zoning office is located at the town offices and is open Monday through Thursday from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm and Tuesday evenings from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm. LIBRARY DIRECTOR

In celebration of the library's centennial, well-wishers gathered on a beautiful June day for refreshments and a walking tour that highlighted items of note — the wavy panes of antique glass in the old section of the building, the oil portrait of first librarian Lizzie Sanborn, the marble bust of Dickens donated in 1912, the vintage 1790's tall clock, and a dozen other curiosities that make our library unique. Our special guest was Cedric Dustin, grandson of John S.R. Brown, the first citizen to check out a book on Opening Day June 24, 1909.

Especially when economic times are tough, the library is a bright spot in the community. With people relying on high speed Internet access for job searches, online applications, and e-mail, the library added two more public computers to shorten the waiting time and bring the total number available to six. The Wi-Fi service was also heavily used as library patrons settled into comfortable seats with their laptops. A generous donor added a new family pass for the WWII Wright Museum in Wolfeboro to those we already offer: Canterbury Shaker Village, Children's Museum, Currier Museum of Art, McAuliffe-Shepard Discovery Center, Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum, Museum of NH History, and the Squam Lakes Science Center. The number of people using the passes in season from July to November of 2009 was up 79% over the same months in 2008 as affordable family outings were in demand.

More than ever the library has been a center for literacy, art, entertainment, and civic service. Book group is a vibrant monthly gathering of close to twenty men and women with ages ranging through seven decades! Offered three times a week by the Children's Librarian, story time beat its own record with a hefty 1,309 children in attendance for the September to May season. The 100 children in

the Summer Reading Program read more than 3,300 books. Children are enjoying a series of doll displays loaned by Jane Parker. Families canceled Netflix and saved money as they enjoyed movie after movie for free from the library. The number of DVDs taken out for fiscal year 2008–2009 was 5,417, and that figure continues to grow. The art shows brought us color and creativity. Artists featured so far include Bea Moore, Mary Villaume, Byron Moser, Jean Buck, Ron Gibeault, Susan Harris, Ken Krzewick, and residents of the Richard Brown House. We are working with area artists to form an art group which will meet monthly. Civic groups using the meeting room include the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Lions Club, Freedom Hill Co-op, Community Action, 4H, Loudon Recreation Department, Loudon Youth Athletic Association, as well as others who hold occasional meetings. That's not to mention library programs such as movie nights, book sales, educational workshops, and special children's events.

In 2009, 113 new households, with a total of 259 individuals, signed up at the library. The more than 1500 registered borrowers, many of whom have family cards, make the most of what the library has to offer. Some great resources, such as the Downloadable Audio Books with access to more than 3,000 titles, are online services that can be accessed from people's home computers. Stop by for a complete list. We will enjoy seeing our long-time library users in the coming year and look forward to meeting people who haven't been in for awhile or who come in for their first time. Here's to the next 100 years!

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

For years, many people have found that using the library is a very economical way to have the enrichments of life, on a shoestring budget. The recent downturn in the economy has caused a large increase in library usage. We are seeing that those of us who have been hit hard financially turn to the library more often to fill our needs prudently. The library is here to serve the community and has a variety of products and services for all.

Thanks to a drop in oil prices, we were able to transfer \$5000 from the fuel oil line to the part time wages line to cover the staffing needed to allow us to be open another four hours a week in 2009–2010. The library now stays open until 9:00 p.m. on Thursday nights. This not only provides more time for townspeople to use the library, but also opens up the meeting room for another evening. Ideally, there will come a time when we will be open a full forty hours per week again and have adequate coverage to meet the public's need.

The Children's Room has been furnished this year with two love seats, two comfortable chairs, playful vinyl-covered shapes that double as seats, a reading nook by the elevator, a diaper changing table and accessories for the disabled in the bathroom, and new cabinets in the children's craft room. It is a beautiful, welcoming, and warm space for our children and is well used and enjoyed. These purchases were made possible thanks to a gift from the Bahre Family.

Looking back over the past year, we are grateful to acknowledge the many generous people who wanted to help the library provide for our citizens. Our sincere thanks go to Carole Richardson, H. Jack Willis, the Hardy Road District, Pam Bartlett and the Rug Hookers, Muriel Ford, the Happy Hill 4H, Ed Epp, Earl Dunbar, James and Bernice Beard,

Jean Silver, Byron Moser, Phil and Patty Browne, Andrew Parrella, Tracy Barrett, Della and Richard Cartier, and Heather Hayden.

Greg Silva regretfully resigned as Trustee this past year leaving the last year of his term to be filled. In April, the Selectmen appointed Deb Kardaseski to finish Greg's term. Deb has proven to be a positive addition to the board, taking on varied tasks and providing new insight. We thank her for her year of service. The Selectmen also appointed two alternates, Ken Krzewick and Marilyn Sylvester, from the three people suggested by the Trustees to serve out Greg's term. The library board has never had alternates, but we have found them to be a beneficial addition to the board and plan to continue the practice. Alternates serve as back up Trustees, contributing to discussion and voting when an elected Trustee is away.

The New Hampshire Library Trustees Association has a conference every year as well as classes to help Trustees be knowledgeable about standards and trends for libraries. Thanks to scholarships, five of us were able to go to the all day conference in Conway where we shared ideas with Trustees from all over the state and heard informative speakers. As the library promotes education for the public, the Trustees and staff strive to keep their own education up-to-date.

We look forward to working together as we build on the library's successes.

RECREATION COMMITTEE

The mission of the Loudon Recreation Committee is to provide affordable opportunities and diverse programming to all members of the Loudon community.

This was another amazing year for the Loudon Recreation Committee. This year we added new programs, instructional classes and created a revolving fund.

The revolving fund is a separate account used for programming where a fee is charged to participants. This allows the Recreation Committee to continue to develop new programming and will eventually allow this type of programming to fund itself.

A Loudon Parks and Recreation Subcommittee Survey went out to the community to look at the possibility of a year round multipurpose rink for ice skating in the winter months and roller blading in the warmer months. Received were approximately 150 responses in favor of a rink. A subcommittee was developed and met over several months, however there was not consistent attendance and the subcommittee has been put on hold.

The old playground equipment at the Recreation Field was removed and the area cleaned up. A new playground structure was set up by the Recreation Committee and LYAA. The brush and trees were trimmed making this area more visible to parents.

Our Community Summer Fun Nights, which is held on Wednesday evening in July and August at the Recreational Field was once again well attended by the community bringing in between 20 and 150 spectators at each event. We kicked off the season with our annual ice cream social with face painting and field events for the kids. Our line up for the season included; Mark Brodeur, a local talent who sang and played acoustic guitar, The Freeze Brother's Band, Mr. Phil's Magic Show, Wildlife Encounters, and the 39th Army Band.

Our final show was a collaborative effort with local talent. Prizes were awarded the top three acts voted on by the audience. This was an amazing way to end the summer season for participants and spectators. Look for this event again next year and practice your talent to share with the community!

Kim Therrien, Loudon Resident, Loudon Recreation Committee member, and tennis player provided summer tennis lessons at the Homer F. LaBonte Memorial Tennis Courts at the Recreational Field.

Dave Therrien constructed a tennis back board with supplies donated by Loudon Building Supply. This is a great addition to the tennis courts allowing people to play independently.

The Red Cross Babysitting Course was held at LES where 10 students participated.

We had great weather for our two, two week sessions of Summer Swim Lessons through Swim NH, LLC at Clough Pond. This program served approximately 70 youth.

We were pleased to offer a week long theater camp through Children's Stage Adventures.

This program provided a theater experience for 40 actors! We have an amazing amount of young talent in Loudon! This all day program was held at the Loudon Elementary School and the show, "A Midsummer Night's Dream" was performed at the end of the week for family, friends and the community – over 175 spectators! Christine Campbell, Loudon Resident and Loudon Recreation Committee Member organized the program along with the assistance of Amanda Masse, Loudon Resident and Loudon Recreation Committee Member and Jen Pfeiffer, Loudon Resident and Loudon Recreation Committee Member. A special thanks to Reverend Henry Frost who volunteered as the pianist for the show. The event was a huge success!

This year was the third annual Winter Carnival. Snow shoes were rented from EMS and the nature trail at the Recreation Field was well traversed. The snowman contest had several participants and the top three winners received gift certificates to Brookside Pizza. There was a warm, toasty bon fire to warm up with free hot cocoa and cookies. A lunch of hot dogs, chips, and a drink was also available for a small fee. Community volunteers helped to make this event a huge success.

In March, we hosted our first Monarchs Recreation Night where 30 members of the community went to watch a game.

Spring and Summer golf was a huge success at Loudon Country Club running two sessions of approximately 30 participants from youths to adults.

Tai Chi classes were held for 10 adults at the Loudon Elementary School for 4 weeks taught by instructor Marcia Wyman.

COMMUNICATIONS COUNCIL

Since 1998, the Loudon Communications Council has served as a Town of Loudon organization dedicated to providing a comprehensive source of information and education about local businesses, government, and community organizations in order to facilitate and encourage informed citizen participation. Every year since its inception, the Council has seen significant growth in its list of regular contributors to the *Loudon Ledger*. Each issue includes minutes from the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, and Library Trustees, as well as minutes and reports from other organizations such as the Conservation Commission and Historical Society. There are regular articles from the Police Dept./Code Enforcement, with special attention to publicizing DARE Pizza Night and the department's Annual Blood Drive. The Council runs articles submitted by Town organizations including the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Young at Heart, Loudon Churches, Recreation, LYAA, Old Home Day, the School District (high school, middle school and elementary school), Recycling, American Legion, and Loudon Lions Club. In some instances, we also include information from certain organizations outside of Loudon, such as the Community Action Program or Visiting Nurse Association when they are providing services to Loudon residents. We regularly publish information about Emergency Preparations, Fire Safety, and Town Meeting (including warrant articles and a budget overview) as well as Health Updates and Wildlife Education.

Recently, we have seen increased interest in the Council's website (www.loudonnh.org) which also provides a useful source of information where visitors can find calendars of Town events, policy documents and regulations, downloadable applications for permits and services, meeting minutes and archived copies of the *Ledger*. Currently, the website includes a comprehensive review of proposed planning and zoning amendments to be offered at this year's Town Meeting. As with the *Ledger*, the website also provides an inexpensive venue for local businesses to advertise, one factor we consider especially important in the current economic climate.

The Communications Council remains exempt from federal income tax as a publicly supported organization, as described in the Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(3). Maintaining tax-exempt status requires us to receive at least one-third of our total support from governmental units and from contributions made directly or indirectly by the general public. While a substantial portion of our operational expenses are covered by advertising revenues, advertising revenue cannot be a principal source of total support; otherwise, the Council would lose its status as a tax-exempt organization. We appreciate the continuing financial support that the Town of Loudon provides to maintain this important community resource.

Because the Council members are all volunteers, we depend very heavily on community involvement, as do all the other community organizations. We are especially grateful to those members who serve now and have served in the past as Treasurer, Secretary and Webmaster (or in our case, Webmistress) — jobs that require continuing commitment and attention to detail. Thanks to our volunteer "delivery team," that picks up bundles of the *Ledger* from the printer, delivers them to the mailing service, returns to collect the "extras" that don't get mailed, and then delivers them to various businesses throughout town. We also owe a debt of gratitude to all the men and women who have volunteered to serve as members of the Council throughout these last eleven years. Without them, none of this would be possible. Finally, no report would be complete without acknowledging our sincere appreciation for the hard work, dedication and professionalism of our Communications Coordinator and Ad Salesperson.

The Loudon Communications Council's meeting schedule, mission statement and submission guidelines can all be found in *The Loudon Ledger* and at www.loudonnh.org. If you have a suggestion, an article you'd like to submit, a regular feature you might volunteer to write, or if you would like to participate in Council meetings, we would love to hear from you. We welcome everyone who is interested in participating.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

It has been another busy year for the Loudon Conservation Commission. We gained another member, Bill Gabler, who has already added much enthusiasm and knowledge to an already talented group! Bill's background and attention to detail will help keep us focused and progressive. Jess Storey, a long time member of the Commission stepped down this year as she and her husband moved to New Hampton. We thank her for all her hard work and she will be sorely missed. And to the rest of the Commission's members, you have my deepest thanks for all your hard work this year.

This year we hired Rob Buzzell, a Loudon resident, to do some monitoring work for us. Rob has been doing an excellent job getting our monitoring obligations current and files in order. Rob will continue working for us in 2010; he is a recent graduate from the University of Maine in Orono with a degree in surveying.

Members of the Commission worked hard in 2009 with the Planning and Zoning boards on wetland and steep slope issues. Our work with NHMS on a wetland mitigation project protected a 54-acre parcel of land in the Bumfagon Brook drainage system. The tract has 31-acres of upland habitat and contains five different wetland habitat types

which includes frontage on the Canterbury River and Bumfagon Brook. NHMS purchased the land which they then donated to the town. NH Fish and Game will hold the easement on the property, which gives them monitoring responsibilities. It is a beautiful piece of property and a real asset to the town.

The Commission helped protect Rocky and Clough Ponds from milfoil and other invasive plants this year by providing funding for monitoring and eradication efforts.

Our mission as your town's Conservation Commission is to help protect Loudon's natural resources, to monitor the lands that we have acquired and work with other town officials to see that Loudon's growth efforts are resource friendly and well placed.

We are always looking for new members and the public is always welcome to come to one of our meetings, which are held the second Wednesday of the month in Charlie's Barn starting at 6 p.m. Come stop by and see what we are all about.

AGRICULTURE COMMISSION

The Loudon Agricultural Commission was established by popular vote at the March 2009 Town Meeting. Authorized by state statute, the purpose of the Agricultural Commission is to recognize, promote, enhance, and encourage local agriculture of all kinds and advise, upon request, the Planning Board and other local boards and agencies on matters affecting agricultural resources.

This first year for the Commission has been busy. Four speakers and a community forum were hosted at the Loudon Community Building. Rachel Valladares, from the NH Dept of Education, spoke to us regarding the NH Migrant Education Program. Stacy Luke came in from the Merrimack County Conservation District office to present information about soil surveys and services provided to farmers by the USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Alex Lehman explained opportunities with Cultural Homestays International, a non-profit organization that could be of value to farms in Loudon. Rob Johnson discussed the many ways that the NH Farm Bureau is supporting agriculture across NH.

Lastly, Loudon was able to host a public forum held by the Capital Area Farm and Community Connection. Area residents were able to share ideas on how to develop a local food network in the region. Loudon is considered by some to be the most actively farmed town in all of Merrimack County, and as such, our agriculture will continue to play a vitally important role. Simultaneously, the land conservation commitments made by Loudon farmers over the years

have established Loudon as a community that is known for placing a significant value on open space.

A new Town-wide soil map was obtained and presented to the Selectmen, having been requested by the Agricultural Commission from the Merrimack County office of the USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Commission. This map incorporates changes in mapping technology and soil classification methods, uses the most recent soil survey data, and augments soil information that exists in our Town Master Plan.

The Agricultural Commission made an effort to assist the Planning Board with some proposed changes to the Loudon Zoning Ordinance in areas that address agricultural resources and agricultural opportunities within the town.

The Commission has established a web site in the effort to enhance and encourage agricultural activities in Loudon. It can be found on the web at: <http://www.loudonag.org/>. The Commission has also been supported by the Loudon Communications Council and has now been given a permanent spot in the *Loudon Ledger*. As the Commission progresses, we would like to include all Loudon farms in the list published in the *Ledger*. Please let us know if you would like to serve on the Commission or if you are a farmer and would like to be listed with all the farms in Loudon.

UNH COOPERATIVE EXTENSION MERRIMACK COUNTY

UNH Cooperative Extension, the public outreach arm of the University of New Hampshire, has engaged New Hampshire residents for 95 years with a broad variety of non-formal educational offerings. One in four Merrimack County residents took advantage of at least one Extension program last year.

We offer programs in parenting, family finances, food safety, home gardening, 4-H (including clubs, camps, special interest programs and after school programs for children and teens), nutrition education for low-income families, and acculturation for refugee families. We respond to the needs of forest landowners, commercial farmers, niche growers, farmers' markets, and many other groups.

Merrimack County Extension educators also work extensively with towns and school districts, organizing and advising after-school programs, helping school and town groundskeepers maintain athletic fields, landscaped areas, and town forests. We provide guidance to community boards on current use, timber tax law, and other land-use issues. We also help social service agencies plan programs and stay current with the latest research and best practices.

Our county staff participate — and sometimes take leadership roles — in many state and local coalitions, among them the Franklin and Concord Asset Building Coalitions, the Concord Substance Abuse Coalition, the Timberland Owners Association, N.H. Farm and Forest Exposition

board, Ausbon Sargent Land Trust outreach committee, N.H. Association for Infant Mental Health, the state Marriage and Family Advisory Board, the N.H. Volunteer Administrators Association, and Pittsfield Youth Workshop.

Merrimack County Extension provides fact-sheet notebooks to all town libraries and our educators often appear on WPTL Radio (107.7 FM), which offers information to residents throughout the station's listening area.

UNH Cooperative Extension operates a statewide toll-free Info Line (1-877-398-4769) at our Family, Home & Garden Education Center, staffed Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m.–2:00 p.m., and 5:00 p.m.–7:30 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. Last year, the Info Line handled nearly 600 requests from Merrimack County residents.

Finally, UNH Extension trains and supports more than 5,000 volunteers statewide: 4-H leaders, master gardeners, wildlife coverts, community tree stewards, water quality monitors, marine docents, and others, who extend the reach of Extension programs into many domains of New Hampshire life. If volunteer opportunities interest you, please call Merrimack County Extension Office at 796-2151, or stop by the office at 315 Daniel Webster Highway in Boscawen next to the County Nursing Home on Route 3.
